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SALE NO.45 OF 11TH/13TH NOVEMBER, 2019.

COMMENTS

An all-round increase in crop intakes has been reported from the planting districts following sunshine in the mornings and evening showers that are considered ideal for flush.

This week's quantity of 5.7 m/kg showed no significant change when compared to last week's auction. Low Grown Leafy/Tippy/Premium Flowery Grades comprised of 2.6 m/kgs, whilst Main Sale High & Medium category teas totaled 0.6 m/kgs. Teas on offer in the Ex Estate catalogue amounted to 786,237 kgs.

Fair demand was once again seen for leafy low grown teas as well as tippy teas. Well made BOP1's/OP1's were fully firm to occasionally dearer whilst OP/OPA's were fully barely steady. Shotty and well-made Pekoes were about firm but bolder varieties were firm to dearer. Buyers for Saudi Arabia and other Middle Eastern destinations were active whilst buying interest from buyers for Russia, and, the C. I. S. as well as Turkey was more selective. In the "Tippy & Small Leaf" catalogue, there was sustained demand from Iran and the U. A. E. The better FBOP's and FBOPF1's were firm, while below best teas were dearer. The best tippy teas continued to sell well at fully maintained prices.

The stronger market undertone that prevailed for ex estate teas since the sale of October 9, 2019 showed a further burgeoning of demand this week, and, good liquoring teas from both western and eastern slopes appreciated Rs. 20/- to 30/- in value compared to the previous week. Buyers for Japan, Taiwan, Germany and other niche European markets were active whilst interest from Hong Kong was subdued possibly in view of the current state of unrest in that country . CTC teas from the high and medium elevations too saw dearer prices amidst more robust demand from "Tea Bag" buyers operating for Russia.

This week's auction comprised of **10,452** lots with a total quantity of **5,724,948** kgs. The catalogue-wise breakdown was as follows:-

In the below best category, brighter sorts together with plainer clean leaf varieties were dearer Rs.20-30/-per kg and more as the sale progressed whilst the balance were irregular following quality. Nuwara Eliyas met with less demand and were difficult of sale. Udapussellawas which commenced Rs.10-20/-per kg dearer, appreciated further as the sale progressed. Uvas were dearer by Rs.30-40/-per kg and more at times.

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INTERNATIONAL TEA NEWS

Britain faces TEA shortage as Kenyan governor threatens Zimbabwe-style farm grabs if the UK does not pay £15billion reparations for evicting tribes during colonial times.

Britain could face a tea shortage in a row over land that was seized from native people in colonial-era Kenva. A Kenvan governor is demanding £15billion of reparations for land that was 'stolen' in the 1930s and has warned of Zimbabwe-style farm grabs if Britain does not pay up. Paul Chepkwony is threatening to seize as much as two-thirds of the farmland in Kericho County's tea country in a move which could cripple the supply to Britain. Kenya is the largest tea supplier to the UK and there are some signs of gathering momentum behind Mr Chepkwony's campaign, the Daily Telegraph reports. The Colony of Kenya became a formal British possession in 1920, formed out of what was previously the East Africa Protectorate. Land seizures had begun in the early 20th century but accelerated from the 1920s, after colonists realized Kericho County's exceptional suitability for growing tea. The people evicted were herded into so-called 'native reserves', where conditions were often appalling. In an extreme case, the entire Talai clan was deported by decree in 1934. Hundreds of families were interned in Gwasi, a barren land two-weeks walk to the west, where malaria was endemic and water scarce. Today, many of their descendants live as squatters with no land. Most possess nothing more of their past than chunks of pottery and other fragments unearthed from beneath the tea fields. Kenya declared independence in 1963 but much of the land is now owned by Western corporations including Unilever and Williamson Fine Tea. Some of the Talai people have filed an official complaint with the UN in a bid to force an apology and reparations from Britain. The land seizure itself may have complied with colonial law at the time, but many people believe there were human rights abuses for which no-one has ever been held responsible. A UN ruling against Britain could shame the UK government into making amends, they hope.

In the colonial period, local people were evicted from their land and often kept in terrible conditions in so-called 'native reserves'. In the most extreme case, the entire Talai clan was deported from tea country in 1934 with hundreds of families forced to live on barren land. The land is now owned by commercial giants including Unilever, the company behind Lipton tea. Mr Chepkwony, the governor of Kericho County, has demanded that the British government acknowledge the land was 'stolen'. If Britain does not pay up, he said he feared he would not be able to stop people overrunning the farms. 'It is in the interest of the UK Government and the multinational companies to settle this matter quickly if they are to live in harmony with the community,' he said.

Kericho boasts some of Kenya's most profitable agricultural land, but the native people say they reap none of the benefit. Tea is crucial to Kenya's economy and firms have long believed that the Kenyan government was unlikely to act in such a way as to threaten the industry. However, Mr Chepkonwy's campaign gained momentum in March this year when a National Land Commission called on the UK to apologize.

MOMBASA TEA AUCTION MARKET REPORT

SALE NO.46 OF THE 11th & 12th NOVEMBER, 2019.

There was irregular demand for the 151,710 packages (10.08) in the market and eased as the sale progressed with 13.35% neglected.

The best **BP1's** on offer saw reduced competition and eased by USC10-USC30 while Brighter varieties met irregular interest and ranged between firm to USC26 dearer to easier by up to USC36 with Mediums irregular varying between USC5-USC20 above previous rates to easier by up to USC13. Plainer descriptions steady to USC4 above last prices but a few lines were unsold.

Best **PF1s** in the market shed USC4-USC21 with Brighter sorts easing by USC6-USC8 while Medium categories were firm to USC4 dearer but some invoices shed up USC2. Plainer types advanced by up to USC6 but others eased by up to USC3 particularly towards the close.

The best **PDUSTs** available saw improved interest gaining up to YSC38 but a few lines eased by up to USC9 while Brighter sorts eased by USC6-USC7 with Medium categories firm to USC14 below previous levels. Plainer varieties were irregular varying between firm to USC4 dearer to easier by a similar margin towards the close.

Best **DUST1s** on offer lost USC12 to USC16 while Brighter categories were irregular and ranged between firm to USC10 dearer to easier by a similar rate with Mediums steady to USC8 below previous levels. Plainer descriptions discounted by USC40USC10 and Plainest remained without bids.

In the **Secondary Catalogues**, BPs were dearer while PFs appreciated. Clean well sorted coloury Fannings gained with DUSTs firm. Other Fannings were steady while similar DUSTs eased. BMFs were well absorbed.

Pakistan Packers lent strong support and were dominant with more interest from Bazaar while Yemen and other Middle Eastern countries showed strong activity but at lower levels. Egyptian Packers showed useful enquiry but operated at lower levels. Sudan lent good support with useful but reduced interest from Kazakhstan, other CIS nations and Afghanistan. UK were active but selective with less interest from Russia while Iran were quiet. Somalia were quite active at the lower end of the market.

CTC LEAF: 57,798 packages of Current Season and 70 packages of Old Season teas on offer met with a fair demand at irregular rates.

BROKENS: Good Brokens were a bright feature of the sale and were mostly dearer following competition. Other Brokens met with a fair demand but eased further with fair withdrawals. Plainer types were often difficult of sale with more withdrawals. Poor varieties met with only a little interest with heavy withdrawals.

FANNINGS: Good Fannings met with a strong market and were a touch dearer following competition. Other varieties met with a fair demand but were easier with several withdrawals. Plain and poor varieties met with much less interest and there were heavier withdrawals.

CTC DUST: 10,530 packages of Current Season teas met with a fairly good demand. Clean, well made, good liquoring teas met with a good competition and sold at firm to dearer rates. Medium teas sold at around last levels. Plain and BLF teas were an easier market with quite fair withdrawals. Blenders lent good support with fair interest from the Loose tea buyers.

COMMENTS: Demand was rather erratic this week. A few better liquoring types were well received and were dearer following competition but all others declined and there were very heavy withdrawals.
