COMMENTS

Sale #15 which was concluded this week from April 23 through 24, 2020 via Electronic Platform comprised of a total quantity of 5.2 m/kgs which was an improvement of 2.3 m/kgs over the previous auction. Low Grown Leafy/Tippy/Premium Flowery Grades comprised of 1.9 m/kgs, whilst Main Sale High & Medium category teas totaled approximately 0.8 m/kgs. Teas on offer in the Ex Estate catalogue amounted to almost 0.8 m/kgs.

Teas of rotorvane type manufacture on offer in the Ex Estate catalogue received less demand at irregularly lower levels barring the select best Westerns which were firm to dearer. There was sustained demand from buyers for Japan, Hong Kong and the Far East at slightly lower levels and the overall demand was benefitted by the stronger presence of a large multinational liquoring buyer. The "Tea Bag" segment was again supported by Russia. The best available CTC teas from the High and Medium elevations were fully firm to irregularly dearer but teas with poorer leaf were marginally easier. Selected Low Grown PF1's were firm and Rs. 10/- to 20/-dearer.

Low Grown leafy teas received good overall demand from buyers for the Middle East as well as Russia and Turkey. Stylish leafy BOP1's/OP1's were firm whilst the better OP/OPA's ruled firm to dearer. There was much better demand this week for secondary and poor leaf OP/OPA' which appreciated up to Rs. 20/- and more. Shotty Pek1's were about maintained, and bolder Pekoe too were better received compared to the previous sale. The neater FBOP's and FBOPF1's continued to be actively sought after by Iran. Buyers for the C I S and Russia operated for well-made leafy descriptions. Very Tippy Teas continued to attract useful demand. There was maintained demand from Iraq and Libya.

Sri Lanka's Tea Production statistics for February, 2020 have been released by the Sri Lanka Tea Board, and, our detailed circular is attached to this edition of the Tea Market Report. During the period January/February, 2020 the total harvest of 39.8 m/kgs shows a significant drop of 5.1 m/kgs, compared to the corresponding period of 2019.

This week's auction comprised of **9,500** lots with a total quantity of **5,232,039** kgs. The catalogue-wise breakdown was as follows:-

BOP: Best Westerns - Select high priced teas were irregular and mostly easier. Teas in the Below Best category were barely steady, whilst teas at the lower end gained Rs. 10-20/- per kg. Nuwara Eliya's were substantially easier though still quite attractive. Uda Pussellawa's were Rs. 10-20/- per kg lower. Uva's declined Rs. 30-50/- per kg and more.

BOPF: Best Westerns were irregular following quality. Teas in the Below Best category were irregular though, in general continued to sell around last. At the lower end, teas were Rs. 30-40/- per kg lower. Nuwara Eliya's were neglected. Uda Pussellawa's were irregular following quality. Uva's declined Rs. 20-30/- per kg and more.

Crop & Weather From 13th to 19th April, 2020

Western/Nuwara Eliya Regions - Both regions reported bright mornings and wet evenings throughout the week. The Department of Meteorology predicts rain fall (above 100mm) in the week ahead in both regions.

_Uva/Udapussellawa Regions - Sunny mornings and evening showers were experienced during the week in both regions.

Low Growns - Ruhuna and Sabaragamuwa regions reported clear mornings and evening showers. Misty mornings are predicted in the Sabaragamuwa Region according to the Department of Meteorology.

Crop Intake - All planting regions showed a moderate increase in the crop intake.

MOMBASA TEA AUCTION

MARKET REPORT – SALE NO.16 OF 21ST /22ND APRIL, 2020

There was strong demand for the 181,917 packages (12.12m/kigs) in the market. 6.63% remained unsold.

Best BP1s available were irregular varying between steady to USC4 dearer to easier by up to USC14 with Brighter types ranging between firm to USC5 dearer to easier by up to USC15 while Mediums met less interest and eased by USC8 - USC14 and some invoices were unsold but a few improved lines gained up to USC5. Lower Medium categories were steady to USC5 above previous rates with plainer sorts better absorbed at firm to USC15 dearer.

The Best PF1s in the market were firm to USC4 dearer while Brighter varieties shed USC2 -USC18. Medium sorts met an irregular enquiry and ranged between USC3 - USC6 dearer to easier by up to USC10 with a few lines remaining unsold. Lower Mediums were irregular and varied between steady to USC10 above previous week's levels with a few improved invoices gaining substantially following quality while others eased by USC6 - USC7. Plainer descriptions appreciated by USC8 - USC22.

Best **PDusts** on offer gained USC4 - USC9 while Brighter categories appreciated by USC2 - USC6 with Medium types advancing by USC2 - USC17. Lower Medium varieties were again strongly competed for and held steady to USC30 dearer with Plainer types firm to USC6 above last prices.

The Best **DUST1s** in the market appredated by USC4 - USC19 with Brighter varieties well competed for and gained USC18 - USC35 while Mediums met an irregular enquiry ranging between USC2 - USC12 dearer to easier by up to USC18. Lower Medium sorts were a strong feature and gained USC6 - USC68. Plainer descriptions were USC2 to USC6 dearer.

In the **Secondary Catalogues**, BPs were dearer while PFs appreciated. Clean well sorted coloury Fannings gained with DUSTs dearer. Other Fannings held value while similar DUSTs were steady. BMFs were well absorbed.

Egyptian Packers and Pakistan Packers showed very strong support and were dominant with increased and strong interest from UK. There was more and useful activity from Yemen and other Middle Eastern countries with useful enquiry from Kazakhstan, other CIS states, Sudan and Russia. Bazaar were active but selective with reduced and selective support from Afghanistan while Iran showed selective interest. Somalia were more active at the lower end of the market.

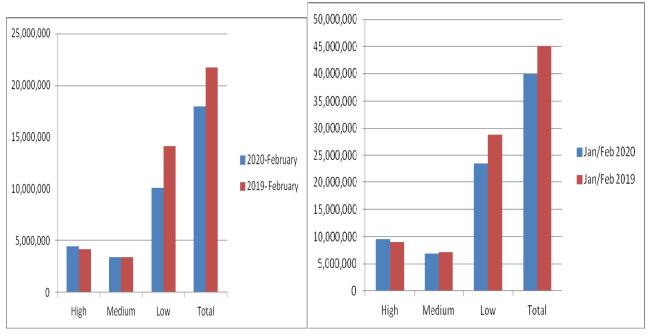
The drought conditions prevalent throughout February, 2020 have resulted in a rapid drop in production to 17.9 Mkgs for the month under review compared to 21.7 Mkgs in February, 2019, i.e., a decline of 3.7 Mkgs(-17%).

The production for January / February, 2020 has recorded 39.8 Mkgs which is again a drop of 5.1 Mkgs over the corresponding period last year. A closer look at the detailed crop statistics given below would reveal that the Low Grown plantations have been the worst affected by the prolonged drought conditions.

Given below are more comprehensive details relating to tea production.
