TEA MARKET REPORT

SALE NO: 50 of DECEMBER 19 & 20, 2022

COMMENTS

Sri Lanka's Tea Production for the period Jan / Nov, 2022 has fallen to 231.8 million kilos which is the lowest on record for the past 27 years. All three elevations, namely High, Medium and Low have recorded deficit crops culminating in a drop of 47 million kilos when compared to the corresponding period of 2021. More comprehensive details can be found elsewhere in this report.

This week's tea auction (Sale # 50), was the concluding sale for 2022, and, was conducted on December 19 & 20, 2022 (Mon/Tue), with a weight of 5.1 mkgs, which was similar to the previous week's auction quantity. The Low Grown Leafy, Semi Leafy, Tippy & Small Leaf/ Premium Flowery catalogues totaled 2.3 mkgs, while the Main Sale High & Medium segment had 0.6 mkgs. The Ex Estate category had 0.7 mkgs.

There was good general demand at firm at firm to irregular rates for Ex Estate teas. The best Western BOP's and BOPF's were firm to selectively dearer where supported by special demand, while below-best category teas were mostly firm. At the lower end however, both BOP's and BOPF's lost Rs. 50/- to 100/- per kg. Nuwara Eliya BOP's were mostly easier whilst their corresponding BOPF's appreciated Rs. 50/- and sometimes more. Uda Pussellawa BOP's and BOPF's were irregular, and, easier, with poor leaf teas getting discounted. Uva BOP's were generally firm, while their corresponding BOPF's were barely steady. <u>CTC Teas</u> – High and Medium Grown PF1's mostly sold around last levels. The better Low Grown sorts were fully firm, but, poorer Low Grown types were easier. There were hardly any High and Medium Grown BP1's on offer, while, the limited selection of Low Grown sorts ruled barely steady. There was less demand from the Western Markets, most of whom are slowing down on purchases in view of the upcoming holiday season. Buyers for China and Taiwan were only moderately active. Russian interest was maintained at lower price levels.

There was good demand for Low Grown Teas. Select best OP1's were fully firm to selectively dearer, while improved below-best teas too met increased demand. Teas at the lower end were fully firm. Well-made OP's/OPA's were fully firm to selectively dearer, while, below-best sorts maintained last levels. The best BOP1's gained on last, while, below-best teas held firm. Pekoes / PEK1's were fully firm to dearer following quality. Well-made FBOP's and FBOPF1's were in general firm, while, cleaner below-best sorts ruled firm to dearer. There was good interest from buyers for Saudi Arabia, Iran, The UAE and other Middle Eastern countries. Good demand was also seen from Russia and the CIS. Turkey and Syria continued their support for Pekoe grades. Libya operated for secondary whole leaf grades, whilst Iraq was active on bottom level teas.

This week's auction comprised of 9,975 lots with a total quantity of 5,113,181kgs.

BOPF/BOPFS : BOPFs, in general, were dearer.

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FBOP/FBOP1 : Well made FBOPs were firm to marginally easier, however Below Best and bolder varieties declined. Teas at the lower end were firm. FBOP1s were firm to easier.

FBOPF/FBOPF1 : Tippy teas continued to attract good demand. Best and Below Best appreciated. Teas at the lower end were fully firm. Well made FF1s were firm. Cleaner Below Best too followed a similar trend; balance were easier. Teas at the lower end sold on last levels.

FBOPFSP/EXSP : In the premium catalogue a selection of Very Tippy Teas together with best met with good demand; whilst the balance too followed a similar trend.

Nuwara Etiya's - the limited availability appreciated Rs. 50 per kg and more. Uda Pussellawa s were irregular. Uva's were barely steady.

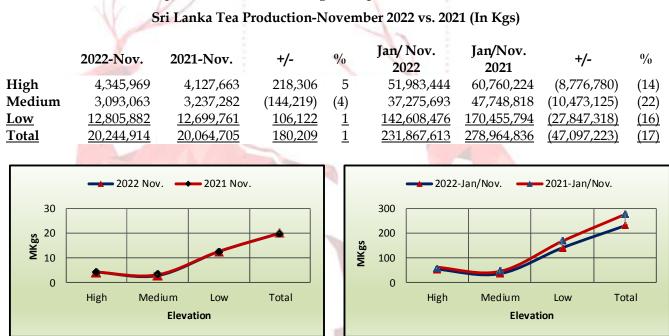


LANKA COMMODITY BROKERS LTD SRI LANKA TEA PRODUCTION- NOVEMBER, 2022



For the first time so far this year the monthly tea production for November 2022, has shown a marginal increase when compared to the corresponding month last year. During January/November, 2022, the total harvest of 231.8 Mkgs, however, is a staggering 47.0 Mkgs below the corresponding figure of the previous year, and, the year 2022, will no doubt be one of the worst in terms of tea production in recent history.

DB participates in Vietnam expo for the first time

18 December, 2022

The Export Development Board (EDB) in collaboration with the Sri Lanka Embassy in Vietnam participated in the 20th edition of Viet Nam Expo at the Sai Gon Exhibition and Convention Centre (SECC) in Ho Chi Minh City recently. This is the first time that Sri Lanka participated in this exhibition.

Hemas Manufacturing (Pvt) Ltd, Ceylon Fresh Teas (Pvt) Ltd, Ceylon Biscuits Ltd, Kelani Cables PLC, Orel Corporation Private Limited, and the four SME companies viz. Healthy Foods Lanka Exports (Pvt) Ltd, Kandrick Tea Beverages Lanka (Pvt) Ltd, Dehami Products and Success Holdings (Pvt) Ltd participated.



The Sri Lankan companies received over 100 trade inquiries and held a large number of business meetings with interested parties.

They have also interacted with over 20 potential buyers of products, mainly in the areas of electric cables, industrial electric products, cinnamon products, and various types of tea.
