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COMMENTS

This week's Tea Auction, namely Sale # 03 of 2023 was held on January 17 & 18, 2023 (Tue/Wed), with a weight of 5.1 mkgs. The Low Grown Leafy, Semi Leafy, Tippy & Small Leaf/ Premium Flowery catalogues totaled 2.2 mkgs, while the Main Sale High & Medium segment had 0.57 mkgs. The Ex Estate category had 0.8 mkgs.

There was fair general demand at easier rates for teas in the Ex Estate catalogue. A selected range of best Western BOP's was firm, but, others eased Rs.50/- and more following quality, while, below-best and plainer BOP's lost Rs.50/- to 100/- per kg. The limited range of Nuwara Eliya BOP's was irregular and easier while Uva / Uda Pussellawa's eased Rs.100/- and sometimes more. The best Western BOPF's were Rs.50/- lower, whilst below-best and plainer teas eased further. Nuwara Eliya BOPF's were barely steady whilst Uda Pussellawa's were irregularly easier. Uva BOPF's lost Rs.100/- to 200/-. CTC Teas – High Grown PF1's were mostly firm, while, coloury Mediums were fully firm and dearer. Prices for Low Grown PF1's were mostly firm. There were hardly any High Grown BP1's on offer, while, Mediums were about firm. Low Grown sorts were firm to easier. There was selective demand from the Western Markets. Buyers for China and Taiwan too were selective. Russian interest was sustained.

There was good demand for Low Grown Teas. Select best OP1's maintained previous levels, while cleaner below-best teas were fully firm. Poorer types however, were often lower. The better OP's and OPA's were firm whilst poorer sorts met with improved interest. The best BOP1's were fully firm while below-best types were barely steady. Pekoes / PEK1's in general were fully firm to dearer. Well-made FBOP's and FBOPF1's were irregular and easier, while, secondary sorts were firm. There was good interest from buyers for Saudi Arabia, Iran, The UAE and other Middle Eastern countries. Sustained demand was seen from Russia and the CIS. Turkey and Syria continued to bid up for Pekoe grades. Libya was active for secondary whole leaf grades, whilst Iraq picked up the bottom level teas.

This week's auction comprised of 9,992 lots with a total quantity of 5,162,286 kgs.

the lower end were firm; balance declined. FBOP1s, in general, were easier.

FBOPF/FBOPF1: Select Best FBOPFs were irregular following quality. However, the leafier varieties

appreciated. Teas at the lower end held firm. Select Best and Best FF1s declined. Few cleaner Below Best and cleaner teas at the lower end were firm; balance were easier.

FBOPFSP/EXSP: In the Premium catalogue, a selection of high priced tippy teas were easier. Best and

Cleaner Below Best sold around last levels. However, the leafier varieties appreciated.

Teas at the lower end were mostly Rs. 50 per kg easier. Nuwara Eliya's were barely steady. Uda Pussellawa's were irregularly easier. Uva's declined Rs. 100-200 per kg.

Cataloguing Rules and Minimum and Maximum Packing Densities

At the CTTA Committee Meeting held this afternoon, the following decisions were made on Cataloguing Rules and Minimum and Maximum Packing Densities.

Cataloguing Rules - Considering the low crops, with effect from the catalogues due to close on 12^{th} of January 2023 (Sale No $5-30^{\text{th}}/31^{\text{st}}$ January 2023), the Cataloguing Rules have been changed as follows;

Main Sale Teas - A factory will be permitted to catalogue a maximum of 3 lots of any grade, in any combination of 10/15 bags or 20 bags or 30 bags (excluding Dust1's, PD's and Premium Flowery grades).

Ex-Estate Sale - Factories selling in the Ex-Estate catalogue shall be permitted to offer a combination of 6 lots comprising of a maximum of 3x10 bags and 3x20 bags or 6x20 bags. This would be applicable for all grades.

CTC Teas - All CTC factories are permitted to catalogue a combination of 12 lots comprising of 3x10 bags and the remainder in 20 bag breaks of BP1 and PF1 grades in the Ex-Estate catalogue.

PD and Dust 1 (High, Mid and Low Growns) -

A factory is permitted to catalogue a maximum of 3 lots of 10 bags and 3 lots of 20 bags. There is no restriction on 40 bag lines.

PD / Dust 1 will be treated as **one grade**, applicable to CTC factories.

Premium Flowery - No change in the current cataloging rules for FFSp, FFExSp and FFExSp1.

In addition, it should be noted that unlimited 40 bags lines are permitted to be catalogued in both Ex-Estate and Main Sale catalogues.

Please note that the rules are applied to the MF/BF/RT numbers and not on selling marks, per factory per sale.

This rule will be applicable <u>up to and including Sale No 13 of 28th /29th March 2023</u>, for which catalogues close on 9th of March 2023.

Grades Nomenclature with Corresponding Minimum and Maximum Packing Densities

We refer to the CTTA Circular No 48 of 2020 dated 9th October 2020 under the above caption.

It has been decided to amend the Circular where the **minimum** packing densities identified <u>per grade</u> has been removed until further notice.
