COMMENTS

This week's Tea Auction, namely Sale # 49 of 2023 was held on Dec. 12 & 13, 2023 (Tue/Wed), and, had a weight of 4.9 mkgs on offer, which was an increase of 0.45 mkgs when compared to the previous week's quantity. The Low Grown Leafy, Semi Leafy, Tippy/Small Leaf & Premium Flowery catalogues totaled 2.0 mkgs, while the Main Sale High & Medium segment had 0.65 mkgs. The Ex Estate category had 0.67 mkgs.

Fair demand was witnessed in the Ex-Estate catalogues which was sold today. A selection of best Western BOP/BOPF were quality was maintained, select invoices appreciated Rs.50-100/- per kg whilst others sold around last week's levels. Teas in the below best and plainer categories declined Rs.50-100/- per kg. Nuwara Eliya teas met with less demand and were mostly unsold. Uva/Udapussellawa's were Rs.50-100/- per kg dearer. CTC Teas – PF1's from all elevations were generally firm with the exception of the poorer sorts which were irregularly easier. BP1's from all elevations sold around last week's levels. There was widespread demand from shippers to Japan, the Continent, China, UK, Russia and the CIS.

In the Low Grown category, a similar trend was observed in both leafy and semi-leafy catalogues as seen in last week's auction. There continued to be strong demand from majority of the Middle Eastern markets.

This week's auction comprised of 10,239 lots with a total quantity of 4,940,006 kgs.

CTC LEAF: 78,945 packages of tea on offer commenced with a good demand which slackened as the sale progressed with a decline in price.

BROKENS: Larger Brokens met with a fair demand but were easier with quality whilst bright liquoring smaller types met with a fairly strong interest and were sometimes dearer. Plain teas were discounted further and there was hardly any interest for these types. As a consequence, there were very heavy withdrawals. BLF teas met with a little demand and declined further in price with heavy withdrawals.

FANNINGS: Good liquoring Fannings met with quite a strong demand and were dearer with quality but as the sale progressed, these eased somewhat. Medium and lower Medium Fannings met with fair interest and mostly were easier in line with quality. However, there were quite heavy withdrawals. Plain types saw only little interest with a sharp fall in price. There were heavy withdrawals in this category. BLF teas met with a little demand and declined further in price with heavy withdrawals.

DUST: 17,997 packages of tea on offer met with fair demand. Good liquoring Dusts met with a fair demand and sold Tk.3/- to Tk.5/- less than last levels. Mediums were an easier market and sold around Tk.5/- to Tk.10/- less than last closely following quality. Plain and BLF Dusts again continued to be difficult of sale and again had heavy withdrawals. Blenders lent good support whilst Loose tea buyers were very selective.

COMMENTS: Offerings were very large (96,942 packages) which comprised of reprinted teas from previous sales. A handful of clean teas were well sought after whilst all others dropped in value. Blenders were quite active with fair interest from the Loose tea buyers. Withdrawal percentage is heavy in this sale which is mostly owing to lack of interest for reprinted teas where only a few lots were sold. Dusts were an easier market.

International Tea Day

Every year on December 15, tea-producing countries celebrate International Tea Day. The day seeks to draw the attention of governments and citizens around the world to the impact that tea trade has on workers and growers. The tea-producing countries that celebrate International Tea Day are Bangladesh, Sri Lanka, Nepal, Vietnam, Indonesia, Kenya, Malawi, Malaysia, Uganda, Tanzania and India. Apart from water, tea is the most popular average in the world. The primary types of tea include white, black, green, oolong, herbal, and pu'erh. Tea is believed to have originated in China. There, drinkers used tea for medicinal reasons. In the 17th century, tea made its way to the UK.

Because of the large number of tea drinkers in the world, tea demands a massive production scale. Unfortunately, in many tea-producing countries, production comes with many challenges. Some of the obstacles tea-producing countries face includes low wages for tea workers, lack of medical care for tea workers in rural areas, and a lack of clean and potable water on tea plantations. There is also a need for improved sanitation on tea plantations. Additionally, women make up 50 per cent of the workforce on tea plantations. These women usually don't have access to education.

The first International Tea Day was held in New Delhi in 2005. However, in 2015, the Indian government reposed to the UN Food and Agriculture Organization to expand International Tea Day across the world. Tea is the most popular of all drinks. Nowadays, some people can go without food, but they cannot go without a morning cup of tea. Tea is made from the leaves of a tea plant. This plant is an evergreen shrub. It grows up to four or five feet in height. For some people, every time is tea time. Whenever a guest drops in, he/she expects to be entertained with a cup of tea. After a day's hard work, a cup of tea is very refreshing. When taken hot, it gives warmth to the body. It is also sometimes used as a medicine for cold and fever. But drinking too much of tea is harmful.

Smell Of Iran's Tea Graft Wafts Wide And Deep



Iranian media is still buzzing with the unfolding details of a colossal corruption case involving nearly \$3.5 billion and key Islamic Republic figures.

The number of officials implicated in the case is so high that the blame game has become very complicated. Iran's economy is plagued by corruption cases that seem systematic and often work like this: An official with a network of other regime insiders manages to secure foreign currency for international trade at discounted government rate and then sells it in the black market.

Whenever such cases are revealed, the authorities usually cope out of responsibility by blaming former administrations or officials from the opposing political camp. However, the \$3.5 billion embezzlement case of Debsh Tea Company involves officials from both the current and the previous presidential administrations -- including ministers of agriculture, industry as well as the governors of the Central Bank of Iran and the chiefs of Iranian Customs Administration. It has also led to discord between the judiciary and the presidential administration as well as the parliament.

Apart from the accusations of corruption between reformist and conservative factions, the government and the judiciary also disagree on how to manage the scandal. President Ebrahim Raisi has called for this case not to become "political," a code in Iranian politics for burying an issue. Raisi called for the cover-up after reports revealed his administration's part in the case. Some reports say that until 2020 the annual budget allocated for importing tea was around \$300 million, but the budget suddenly tripled in 2021 without any justification. Iran International has also learned that former Agriculture Minister Javad Sadatinejad, was removed by Raisi in mid-April in relation to the case.

Debsh Company, handling most of the country's tea imports, received a staggering \$3.37 billion in foreign currency from the government on a preferential exchange rate for tea and machinery imports from 2019 to 2022. However, it has allegedly sold \$1.4 billion of the currency on the free market at a higher rate. The company also sold low-grade tea imported from Kenya as high-grade tea originating from India, with a \$12 difference per kilogram. The company has been also involved in what has been described as fraud by reimporting cheaper Iranian tea and pocketing the difference in foreign currency.

Iran's Chief Justice Gholam-Hossein Mohseni-Eje said Thursday that "The government has reported the dismissal of 60 individuals in this case, but these individuals have not been named." A few hours later, government spokesman Ali Bahadori Jahromi said that the dismissal of 60 managers in the past two years is not only over this particular case. Jahromi said earlier this week that several low and mid-ranking officials have been arrested over the case. The CEO of the company, Akbar Rahimi, is reportedly under arrest too. No reports about the details of these arrests and dismissals have been shared with the media and it is not even known if any court hearing was held.
